This book is available online at generic book sellers (i.e., Chegg, Barnes and Noble, etc.), and at the LAVC bookstore. You must use the book in this online class – failing to do so will have a negative impact on your success.

This class requires you to read – if you cannot take on this commitment, please reconsider this class.

Prerequisite: None.

**Recommended:** English 28, English as a Second Language 8, English as a Second Language 363, or placement into English 101. **This is important.** I encourage all students to better their reading and writing skills. There is an expectation that you read and write at a college level to be successful in this class.

As this is a typical lecture class in half the time of a regular 8-week semester class, so expect to participate for 6 hours a week.

Sociological concepts and theories are used to describe and explain a range of social problems that exist in the United States, such as issues of prejudice, discrimination, suicide, drugs, crime, wealth and poverty, and political radicalism. We will also analyze the effectiveness of attempted and potential solutions to these social problems.

## Getting Started

You will need to log on to our course. Once you log onto the class, read the syllabus, and open MODULES – this will help you navigate the class week by week and link you to required work in the Discussions, Modules and Quizzes in Canvas. You must logon to our class site to retrieve and submit assignments and to participate in regular and substantive class discussions weekly. While mobile phones often have apps to help navigate Canvas, I suggest having computer access as technical issues often occur with mobile phones. Please note I cannot access "cloud" submissions – you will need to convert all assignments into a .doc/.docx or .pdf file to submit them for a grade.

We will all progress through the course together, at the same pace. This is not a class in which you can complete all the work for the semester in the first week or make it all up in the last week. The success of this class depends on the willingness of everyone to participate in regular and substantive discussions regularly, and to share ideas in writing. All our discussions will be asynchronous (not at the same time), not synchronous (e.g., live chat, instant messaging). This will allow you to participate at times suitable for your schedule (with Friday deadlines). Exams will be conducted online and are discussed in the syllabus.
